

A 20 year old Lumbee Indian walked into a store-front church. He was a trucker and the church had opened its doors down the street from where he lived. Because felt welcome, he returned again and again. Eventually, he gave his heart to the Lord during a revival service—that was back in 1959. His name, “Two-Gun” Montana Locklear, a man born and raise in Robeson County, NC.

Two-Gun loved to help others, so his pastor put him to work. He loved others so much that he spoke to them constantly about Jesus. Those he spoke to asked him why he was not credentialed since he was preaching so much. This was God’s first tugging on Two-Gun’s heart to become a pastor.

During his first pastorate Two-Gun became hungry to dig deeper into God’s Word. He considered going to American Indian

Bible College in Phoenix, AZ to get training, but felt he could not afford to go. Rev. Charles Hadden, sister Masters and a few others felt they could assist by starting a school program for

exists to equip Native pastors and leaders to reach their people for the Lord. It was birthed from Two-Gun’s desire to understand God’s Word better and the desire of others to help him in his quest.

Today, Two-Gun is a board member at the college. He states, “You can tell someone who has taken courses at the Bible college, because good teaching makes good preaching.”

Two-Gun has founded and pastored 3 churches. He has also ministered as an evangelist. He tells of a youth revival he ministered at where 42 kids came to the Lord. Today, one of those is a noted evangelist himself. He notes, “I have been fortunate to see hundreds and hundreds of our people saved.” And he is thankful for the tools he received at NABC that equipped him for God’s service.
